Bachelor of Music Audition Requirements 1st - 4th semester

I. Main Audition

Assessment criterion include artistic imagination, sense of style, technical ability and choice of difficulty level of examination pieces, corresponding to the student's development level. The examining board may stop the presentation of a piece. The board has the right to examine the student's musical proficiency in detail. Unless stated otherwise, the duration of the Main Audition is usually 10 to 30 minutes, depending on the course. Piano and harpsichord accompanists and rhythm groups available. Students should bring a copy (three copies for jazz) of the sheet music for the accompaniment.

1. Pre-selection stage (submitted video)

- Pieces/movements chosen by the applicant from the repertoire of the Main Audition listed under 2. For oboe, the compulsory piece must be included.

(Duration: approx. 15-20 minutes, uncut presentation within the individual pieces)

2. Main Audition

Flute

- three complete works from different periods
- sight-reading

Oboe

- Compulsory piece: Fantasy No. 3 from Telemann's 12 Fantasies
- two complete works from different periods
- sight-reading

Clarinet

- two complete works from different periods
- sight-reading

Bassoon

- two complete works from different periods
- L. Milde, Konzertstudie Nr. 9 op. 26
- sight-reading

Horn

- two complete works from different periods (minimal requirement: W. A. Mozart: Concert KV 447)
- sight-reading

Trumpet

- two complete works from different periods
- sight-reading

Trombone

- two complete works from different periods
- sight-reading

Tuba

- two complete works from different characters
- sight-reading

Drums

- Examination of the present level at playing the timpani, small drums and one Mallet instrument (vibraphone, xylophone, marimbaphone)

II. Audition in additional subjects

The audition in the additional subjects can be cancelled if the auditioning student has not passed the main audition.

1. Music theory

The music theory EP consists of a written and an oral part. The oral part takes place after the written examination has been passed. The areas of music theory/harmony and counterpoint and ear training are assessed separately.

a. written examination: General music theory and harmony and counterpoint

- Determining and notating intervals, triads and tetrachords and their positions (major, minor, diminished, augmented, dominant seventh chords)
- Determining and notating key signatures and scales (incl. modal scales)
- Harmonic analysis of an easy movement from the 18th or 19th century
- Written execution of simple typesetting tasks
- Stylistic classification of a short excerpt from a score

(duration: approx. 45 minutes)

b. oral examination: Music theory and ear training

- optional: Playing an extended cadence or harmonizing a simple melody on the piano
- if necessary, short questions about the written exam
- Sight-singing and analysing a simple melody
- Improvised addition of a motif
- Representing and/or recognising rhythms, scales, intervals, triads and tetrachords as well as simple sound connections

(duration: approx. 15 minutes)

2. Piano

- Recital of two piano compositions (original pieces) from two stylistic eras (duration: approx. 10 minutes)

Requirements for the 5th semester and above

The audition jury may stop the performance of a composition. The audition jury reserves the right to fully test the musical skills of the auditioning student.

- 1. Pre-selection stage (submitted video)
- Pieces/movements chosen by the applicant from the repertoire of the Main Audition listed under 2.

(Duration: approx. 15-20 minutes, uncut presentation within the individual pieces)

2. Main Audition

- Three complete works chosen by free choice from different periods and five parts of orchestra music

2. Instrumental pedagogy

In the instrumental pedagogy the audition takes place in three parts:

- Music Pedagogy
- artistic main instrument

- main subject-related methodology (takes place as a part of the test for the main instrument)
- 1. Music Pedagogy

Form of the Audition: The audition takes place in a group and in a conversation

Content: At the beginning of the audition the candidates can chose a task out of a variety of different songs, instrumental works and improvisation tasks. After 30 minutes of lead time the candidate works on the chosen piece with the group (maximal 10 minutes per candidate). Afterwards the candidates shall explain their motivation and notion of their future job. (duration: approx. 10 minutes)
